Members and Friends Are Invited to KPAA's Oct. 26th Meeting

"New Tools for Kaua`i Decision-Making and Action" will be the theme of the next KPAA membership meeting, 9 AM to 12 Noon on Wednesday, October 26th in the Culinary Arts Dining Room at Kaua`i Community College. Pre-registration is required. The meeting will include discussion of two new tools to assist County government and the community.

Eric Knutzen and Harry Beatty from the County's Information Technology (IT) Department will offer a presentation and demonstration of "Progress on Kaua`i Using Geographic Information Systems (GIS)". They will offer examples of how this new system provides valuable information to support many County functions.

Also on the program will be an opportunity to provide your ideas about key Kaua`i issues that should be tracked through KPAA's new Community Indicators Project, "Measuring What Matters". Indicators are objective measurements that reflect how a community is doing. They reveal whether key community attributes are going up or down; forward or backward; getting better, worse, or staying the same. Kaua`i will be among over 200 communities around the country with indicators projects.

KPAA's Second Talk Story Session: "Ten Themes for Moving Nonprofits Forward" – Nov. 1st

An informal talk story session for KPAA members will be held on Tuesday, November 1st from 11:30 AM to 1:00 PM at the KPAA office. Discussion will focus on ten points made by Michael Weekes, chair of the National Council of Nonprofit Associations board of directors and president of the Massachusetts Council of Human Service Providers, at a HANO conference on June 30 in Honolulu. Come and share your thoughts on Weekes' ten major themes:

- 1. Nonprofits must define themselves and their role in this civil society
- 2. Accountability isn't a "four letter word'
- 3. Develop our workforce
- 4. Create partnerships, alliances and collaborations
- 5. Nonprofits must engage in public policy
- 6. Leadership begins at home
- 7. Not "or" but "and"
- 8. Innovation requires risk taking
- 9. Get political, educate and vote
- 10. Mission over money.

At the first Talk Story session, held September 6, the need for a centralized community calendar was discussed to aid in meeting and event planning. There was also a lively discussion of some of the pressing concerns facing our island – traffic congestion, rapid growth, housing shortages, and the

perception that Kaua`i's unique way of life is being challenged by the changes we are facing. Everyone agreed these are issues that require our careful and continued attention.

KPAA Launches Community Indicators Project, "Measuring What Matters"

In 2001, when Kaua`i Planning & Action Alliance was still just a germ of an idea of Garden Island RC&D, two consultants – Nadine Nakamura and Roxanne MacDougall – were hired to research community indicators projects across the country, determine the feasibility of such a program for Kaua`i, and suggest a possible organizational structure to support a project. Their report *Shaping Kaua`i's Future Together* resulted from that work. In 2003, Kaua`i Planning & Action Alliance (KPAA) was formed, work began on other goals and now, in 2005, the community indicators project has been launched. An Advisory Committee composed of key leaders from state, local and federal government agencies, nonprofits, and the business community had their first meeting in early October to begin to set the direction of this program. Ideas generated at the October 26th Membership Meeting (see top of page) will be shared with the Community Indicators; these indicators will be shared with the community for their input before the indicators are finalized. Once the indicators are determined, data will be gathered and a report written and available in July 2006.
