Kaua'i Culture and Arts Facility Visioning and Collaboration Building

Background

Culture and the arts was one of six job clusters that were the focus of the report *Kaua`i Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy 2010-2015* (CEDS). The report was prepared by the Kaua`i Economic Development Board (KEDB) for the County of Kaua`i Office of Economic Development (OED).

One of the priority recommendations from that report for this job cluster was to "develop a Kaua`i Center for Culture and the Arts to include exhibit, retail, classrooms, and offices." It was envisioned that this would be "self-supporting, fully staffed, and... accessible to the community."

Funding was appropriated in the FY2012 County budget for Kaua`i Planning & Action Alliance (KPAA) to work with arts and culture organizations to create a vision for a facility that would meet the space needs of these groups. The CEDS report suggested that such a facility might be developed in conjunction with a sports arena, which was another CEDS recommendation within the sports and recreation job cluster.³

KPAA received project funding in April 2012 to accomplish the following tasks:

- Work with Garden Island Arts Council and others to identify planning partners for arts and culture facility.
- With input from arts and culture organizations interested in partnering on a facility, plan and facilitate one or more visioning sessions regarding a facility.
- Work with planning partners to create strategies for collaboration and capacity building needed before undertaking development of an arts and culture facility.

The following report summarizes the work done as a result of that grant and includes the recommendations made by the culture and arts organizations that participated.

Defining the Culture and Arts Community

The CEDS report defined this job cluster as follows:

The Culture & Arts Cluster includes a variety of industries engaged in artistic and cultural activities. Music, film, writing, publishing, graphic design, hula, crafts, photography and performing arts as well as educational and cultural attractions like museums, historical sites, botanical gardens, theatres, and cultural education programs are all included. The

cluster is comprised of both for-profit and non-profit entities engaged in these activities.⁴

A separate CEDS project provided funding to Kaua`i Economic Development Board to assess the feasibility of a digital media facility. After consultation with KEDB and the consultant for that project, the groups and organizations involved in digital media were not included in this project, as their facility needs were being addressed separately.

During the preparation of the CEDS 2010-2015 report, a culture and arts working group (called the "CEDS pod") was formed. The CEDS report identified Garden Island Arts Council (GIAC) as the lead agency that would continue to guide the culture and arts cluster. While GIAC continues to support the report, it did not have the resources to guide the implementation of the CEDS recommendations. The culture and arts working group continued to meet occasionally following publication of the report, convened by the president of GIAC's board. With her 2012 departure from Kaua`i, the responsibility for convening the group was assumed by two group members from Kaua`i Community College.

This working group served as an Advisory Committee to KPAA during this project, providing valuable guidance and support.

A list of culture and arts organizations and groups was developed, drawing upon contact information provided by the Advisory Committee and Nalani Brun from the County of Kaua`i Office of Economic Development. Appendix 1 provides a list of the groups contacted for this project.

Identifying Facility Needs

To identify groups with an interest in working together to establish a culture and arts center and to confirm desire for such a facility, KPAA conducted a survey (online and by mail, for those without email) in September 2012. There were 79 groups identified and contacted. Twenty-eight (28) groups responded to the survey. Following are key survey findings.

- All were interested in participating in helping to plan a facility.
- Only 3 groups who responded have paid staff; 24 do not.
- The primary need for space within the next five years was for offices, indoor
 performance space and a kitchen/eating area so refreshments could be served at events
 (17 responses each). Rehearsal space, dressing rooms and meeting room each received
 15 responses.
- The events or performances planned within the next five years where space will be needed were for classes (art-9 responses, hula-10, choral and music-11, theater-8 and lectures and other classes-16) and for meetings (18 responses) and demonstrations (15).

- When asked if they could pay for space used, 12 said yes, depending on cost. Three (3) said no. And 12 were not sure at this time.
- A number of comments and suggestions were offered in the survey.

Respondents provided contact information for a representative to participate in the visioning sessions. A full copy of the survey results is included as Appendix 2.

Based on the survey results, KPAA planned a series of three sessions intended to identify a vision for a facility.

Facility Visioning Sessions

While many groups had expressed interest in the development of a shared culture and arts facility, once the groups met in person and began discussing the possibility, a different interest emerged.

Major Facility Needs. The primary facility need, according to survey results and those who participated in the visioning sessions, was for a multi-purpose theater/space that could accommodate 200-300 people and be used for performances, exhibits and other uses. Seats would be moveable so they could be configured according to a specific event. Such a facility is presently not available except in hotels, which groups found to be too expensive. The second need was for meeting and classroom space. Again, such space can be found in hotels but the cost is generally outside the budget of these groups.

Reliance on Volunteers. As most groups have no paid staff, participants acknowledged that collaboration to plan and develop a culture and arts facility would fall to volunteers who are already tasked with running the organization. Moreover, there was concern about the viability of creating a self-supporting facility, as most groups need performance space on only an occasional basis. It was not apparent that Kaua`i has a sufficient number of organizations to book a facility often enough to make it self-supporting. Vision session participants began to question whether a facility was needed at this time. They also expressed interest in determining if empty private commercial space could be made available, especially to meet the need for classroom and meeting space.

Facility Options in Development. KPAA became aware of several new facilities being considered or planned that might provide space for culture and arts events. Representatives were invited to present information on plans being made. In the course of the visioning sessions the following information was gathered.

 Creative Technologies Center – Alan Tang with Olomana Loomis ISC, a consultant for KEDB, reported on the facility business plan he is developing through County of Kaua'i Office of Economic Development CEDS funding. (Note: this facility was previously called the digital media center.) The focus of that center will be on technology services and facilities for film, music, etc. available for use on a fee-for-service basis. Included will be a sound stage, recording studio, shared office space, and a small 50-75 seat multipurpose room; the total will be about 10,000 square feet. In subsequent discussions with KEDB and the consultant about the possibility of including a 200-300 multi-purpose theater/space that culture and arts groups could use, the response was that this was not feasible as it did not fit the business model being developed and would require a facility much larger than that being planned.

- Kaua`i Philippine Cultural Center Sonia Topenio reported that her group is now a 501(c)3 nonprofit. They have secured a 3.5 acre site in Puhi next to the YMCA swimming pool with a 99-year lease from the County of Kaua`i and are talking with Grove Farm about additional acreage adjacent to the site. Her group received a \$1.5 million grant from the State Legislature. A feasibility study is underway to plan this "place for all." Space for large banquets is planned. No determination has yet been made, however, about space rental.
- Expansion of KCC Performing Arts Center PAC Manager Tony Kilbert reported that the additional facility being planned will be used for KCC rehearsals and will be one large classroom built in proximity to the Performing Arts Center (PAC). It will not have audience style seating. It is unlikely it will be available for use by outside groups.
- Kilauea Pavilion, Anaina Hou Community Park Cherie Grousset, the director of Anaina Hou, provided KPAA with information about the development of facilities at this Kilauea location. She stated they expect to have permits by the end of 2012 or soon thereafter and break ground six months after that. Facilities will include: conference rooms, a 200-225 seat indoor performing arts and cinema theater, a covered outdoor pavilion with stage, dressing rooms and a landscaped lawn. Space will be available for a fee. (See http://anainahou.org/kilauea-pavilion/.)
- County Parks and Recreation Multi-Use Arena The CEDS 2010-2015 report and the new County Park Master Plan recommended construction of a multi-use 7,500 seat arena in Lihu`e but, according to Parks and Recreation Director Lenny Rapozo, no timeline for its construction has been set. The CEDS report suggested that this arena could be used for sports, hula and cultural events. In discussing this possibility, the culture and arts participants stated they did not envision a need for an arena of that size. The arena could have additional facilities and meeting room built around it, however the group felt that sports, culture and arts are not compatible uses.

Re-Purpose Rather than Build. The group was much more interested in the idea of redeveloping existing space – such as the former Borders Books location or the Salvation Army store on Rice Street, rather than construct a new facility. However, the question remained as to whether any of the organizations and groups wanted to assume the responsibility and financial obligation to create the facility or even to pay for the use of space once established.

Lack of "Community". Among the reasons for the hesitation to plan for a new facility was the lack of a sense of community among culture and arts groups. Each works very hard to be successful, but there are few opportunities for the groups to work collaboratively. There is an absence of regular communication. Presently there is no central calendar of events that all use, resulting in scheduling multiple events simultaneously, so they find themselves competing for an audience. As one participant said, "We don't have a culture and arts community on Kaua'i. To have this, we have to work toward a cohesive 'we'." Further, Native Hawaiian groups saw their arts and culture needs as distinctly different.

Recommendations

Encourage Collaboration, Build Community. A second CEDS grant through the Office of Economic Development is pending to KPAA. KPAA will collaborate with the CEDS pod, currently co-chaired by Peggy Lake and Sarah Tochiki, to convene the culture and arts groups for regular dialogue and action to address some of the challenges they face and encourage leadership within the sector. We will also define the needs shared by Native Hawaiian groups with other arts and culture as well as those that may be distinct. By working together on common issues, a greater sense of community can be developed over time. That project is scheduled to begin in March 2013.

Building Capacity. Capacity-building was identified as a major priority for the culture and arts sector. Suggested training topics include marketing, project management, intellectual property rights, financial management, and board development. Training, technical assistance and capacity-building needs to be provided to community members at an affordable rate and must accommodate their needs and schedules. Through the second CEDS grant to KPAA, a training needs assessment will be conducted.

Online Culture and Arts Calendar. A centralized culture and arts calendar is clearly a priority for these groups. The email listing of arts and culture events prepared and distributed by Carol Yotsuda of the Garden Island Arts Council is a useful marketing tool. An additional tool needed is a centralized online calendar where groups can post their events many months in advance is needed. It appears that www.kauaifestivals.com — which uses the tagline "A Mixed Plate for Everyone!" — can serve this purpose. Once this becomes a resource for all groups, scheduling conflicts can be avoided. It may be necessary to work with OED's Nalani Brun, who manages the website, to ensure that the site accommodates listings for the variety of culture and arts events that are offered. It is also recognized that the calendar may be just one of other collaborative, larger marketing initiatives that could be created by culture and arts community members.

Vision for 2023

The CEDS report contains a very eloquent culture and arts vision. It was originally intended that this project would create a vision related to the development of a culture and arts center, but given the lack

of support for that effort at this time, the group stated its vision for the year 2023. What follows is the third draft of that vision.

The culture and the arts sector on Kaua`i is vibrant and robust with a wide range of talented artists, artisans and cultural practitioners. We have become a collaborative community of visual arts, fine arts and performing arts and cultural organizations and individuals.

We receive enthusiastic support from residents as well as visitors, who plan their travel around our well-coordinated, active calendar of events and activities. There is community-wide recognition and appreciation that these arts and cultural events also provide opportunities for education, youth enrichment and enhancing artistic creativity.

We have taken advantage of training and technical assistance to increase our organizational capacity. As a result, we have strong leadership, our programs are well-funded, and our practitioners and organizations are thriving and prosperous, offering creative career and volunteer opportunities. Culture and arts organizations are vital partners in maintaining a high quality of life and strong economy for the island.

We have ensured that there are facilities located around the island which serve the culture and arts needs of our varied geographic regions and local communities. These facilities include performance and rehearsal space, galleries, classroom and meeting space, and studios. We have access on an as-needed basis to shared offices, with staff, equipment and conference rooms.

Our culture and arts community is committed to sustaining the solid, financially-viable foundation we have created. We are now ready and excited to work together toward establishing an affordable multi-purpose space designed for cultural and arts events and activities that would accommodate up to 300 people.


